(twice), and one of Ely's best friends Jemima (also godmother to Dorothy). Its always so

precious to share this rare time with people special to us and the kids.

Ely's work has seen some change recently. The office space has closed, meaning she now provides counselling and therapy from home via video conference, on site at schools, or in client's homes. This has been a struggle at times, as Ely manages these changes and the associated challenges. A highlight of her job this year has been working in a remote homeland called Dhalingbuy, travelling regularly to provide therapy for a young person living there. The progress seen in this case is an answer to prayer.

Josh's work this year has included two trips to Timor-Leste. It was a huge privilege to experience this fascinating and beautiful country, the welcoming local people and to see the MAF programme there. The landscape is very coastal and mountainous. MAF is the only aircraft operator there doing medevac patient transport to the chronically overcrowded hospital in Dili. The programme there has 3 GA8 Airvans and



requires external engineering support as there's no LAME as part of the team. Josh was in the country primarily to work on one of the Airvans to replace all 6 cylinders on a mid-life turbocharged engine, which turned out to be a very interesting job. During his time there he was also able to attend to some minor issues with the other Airvans to keep things moving in the programme. It was great to be of service there and to see some of the impact MAF are doing in this developing country.

Mid-year we were invited to visit some friends serving as *Pioneers* missionaries in the communities on Elcho Island. It was delightful to experience this special place we'd heard so much about. The Darrwurr homeland was set up by some *Yolnu* Christian ladies specifically as a place for people to come and worship God, pray, and study His word away from the distractions and noise of life in town. This vision is carried on by this amazing couple while they raise their 4 young kids here 'in the bush'!



Most of you would have heard the news in January of the devastating loss of a dear friend, MAF pilot Chis Coffee, killed here in a road incident along with three other people. He was a wonderful man who impacted so many with his generous, joyful heart and his deep love of Jesus. Though grief is held differently by all, his loss is still felt by all who knew him.

It's just been announced there is a foundation named after him to train pilots and engineers from the remote places MAF serves. *The Chris Coffee Aviation Foundation* was launched at MAF's 80th anniversary fundraising Gala on 25 October.

to Build Towards the Future

The Modawa Institute of Higher Education continues to build towards the future, with formal recognition from the Department of Higher Education, Research, Science and Technology.

A new signboard for the Modawa Institute was erected, following a long period of consultation with traditional landholders regarding suitable wording to acknowledge the generosity of those who provided the land upon which "we work, learn, and pray".

David Hand School of Teaching

The David Hand School of Teaching has welcomed its new head, Ms Jean Ifuda. A woman with an Oro Province background, Jean is a very experienced educator. In fact she was one the candidates for Education Department nominated for the Moresby South electorate for the knighthood medal for the King Awards. Ms Ifuda's pedagogical and administrative experience will be of great assistance, as she works with Principal Fr Gabriel Manae in the overall running of the institution.

The School of Education's Year Bachelor of Education (Primary) class is moving towards the conclusion of its first year and planning is well underway for the year ahead. A new female boarding facility is well advanced in construction.



A Ribbon-cutting ceremony was held for the opening of the first building in the dormitory complex for female students. The ceremony was attended by representatives of the Australian High Commission, the Provincial Government, and the Kokoda Track Foundation.

Thanks are due to the support from the DFAT (Australia) PNG Incentive Fund, the Williams Trust (NZ) and the Kokoda Track Foundation. A ribbon cutting ceremony was held on 25 September to celebrate the completion of the first of three buildings in this complex. These buildings may also provide some interim classroom space, while other construction progresses.

Planning for next year in the School of Education is well underway, with library and IT resources identified. Again, the intention is for all students in the School of Teaching to be provided with a laptop.

Bishop Newton School of Theology

The Bishop Newton School of Theology will go into 2026 with its existing cohort, with most students studying at the certificate level. The School of Theology has benefitted greatly from the expansion of Newton College into the Modawa Institute. It means that the larger overall student body can better support the infrastructure required for education, as required for accreditation. Renovated classrooms, IT, an expanded library and better administration are all benefits of being part of a larger Institute.

In 2026, Principal, Fr Gabriel Manae, will commence a part-time Master's Degree Course with Divine Word University, thanks to a scholarship from the St Augustine's Foundation in the UK.

Developing a Nursing Program

Mrs Estelle Jojoba LM continues to work towards approval for the introduction of a Diploma in Nursing. This would involve the use of a newly developed national curriculum. The Institute will need to be able to demonstrate that it has the staffing and infrastructure to be able to support such a program. Mrs Jojoba brings a wealth of experience in nursing education, largely with the University of PNG, as she now works with a planning team to bring nurse education to the Northern Province.

For your prayers and support

The development of the Modawa Institute of Higher Education has come about by the contribution and commitment of many, both in PNG and with our international stakeholders. But it is still an infant in swaddling clothes, full of potential but very fragile. It will continue to need the support of friends and partners if it is to fulfil its potential.

We continue to look to our supporters to provide student scholarships, in either ministry training or teaching (\$1,500, or \$750 for half). Most of the students have no support from their own dioceses and struggle for the very basics of life. Your support can be given through an account set up within the Anglican Deposit Fund, Diocese of Gippsland.



Contribute to the Building Fund. This can be done through the Diocese of Gippsland Account, but please make the purpose clear (Giving code: building). The capital works needed to accommodate these new disciplines is an investment in the present and the future!

Renovate a student house (This can be done through the Diocese of Gippsland Account; giving code *shouse*). Here is a project for a parish that

might extend over a couple of years. We need to renovate each of the student houses, including better reticulation of water and renovation of septic toilets. \$5,000 over two years will make a big difference to one house.

Please remember our students. Each week they face basic challenges, such as the provision of an adequate diet for their families, access to healthcare, or items like school uniforms. They rely almost entirely on the small allowance we provide of K 150 a month for a family (about \$AUD 55) for all their extra needs. They make great sacrifices to train for ministry. Can we make a small sacrifice to support them?

Submerge Phillip Island

On Saturday 25 October, 'Submerge' held a very successful morning tea fundraiser in the Anglican Church hall, in aid of brain cancer research.

Submerge are a group of local women who swim every morning at Cowes beach. Some of the women are taking part in the 'Point to Pinnacle' half marathon up Mt Wellington in Hobart in November. Why would anyone be inspired to walk or run up hill for 21.4Km? In our case it's to support Sarah, a beautiful young mum who dips with the submerge group when she can. Sarah lives with brain cancer and is four years into a two to five year prognosis. However, cancer does not deter her from living her best life and doing her utmost to further brain cancer research. Sarah will have a team of about 50 fellow walkers this year heading up the mountain, including six *Submergers*.

The morning tea was a huge success, selling out of Janet's delicious scones by 11am! Followed by all the delicious, donated slices and cakes by 12! Sarah attended and shared, from a very personal point of view, just how vital these fundraising efforts were in furthering research.

It was sobering to hear: Brain cancer kills more children in Australia than any other disease, kills more under 40s than any other cancer, and 80% of those diagnosed will die within five years. I'm not sure there was a dry eye in the room. However, her words were also very inspiring. Sarah spoke of 'hope'. Hope for raised awareness, hope for new medical break throughs, as with other cancers, and hope for all those living with this currently incurable disease. Sarah shared, "I'm so grateful and humbled by the generosity of these beautiful *Submerge* women and all those who have helped out today".

Due to the generosity of the Anglican Church, the morning tea raised over \$2,500! We could not have done this without the donated space, the support of church members and of course Janet's amazing scones!

Everywhere we look, we see the beauty of spring. Spring always brings to mind the beautiful hymn, "Awake, Awake to love and work!" An absolute favourite of mine from school assemblies.

I thought I would share with you a recipe for strawberry jam and our famous CWA scones. The scone recipe is used every day for the 10 days of the Melbourne Royal Show and our wonderful member, Joy from Traralgon Branch, has just retired after 20 years as the chief scone maker. I was privileged to work alongside her. This year the scone record was beaten with over 17,000 scones baked over 10 days. This is the recipe I use for exhibitions and it is always a winning entry.

Have you ever had difficulty with strawberry jam not setting? A few tips: use fresh strawberries , just picked are best as the pectin is at its highest, a good excuse to go strawberry picking! Pectin is a natural setting agent. Jam sugar can be used if you can't be sure how fresh the strawberries are or if you wish to use frozen fruit, and lemon juice can also be added. Tartaric acid is a natural food acid and I find it consistently helps get a good set.

Strawberry Jam

- 500 grams strawberries, hulled
- 3/4 teaspoon tartaric acid
- 1/4 cup of water
- 500 grams sugar

Method

Chop the strawberries roughly and place in a preserving pan or saucepan with the tartaric acid and water. Bring to the boil and then simmer gently for 10 minutes.

Add the sugar and stir until dissolved. Bring to the boil and boil over medium heat for 20 minutes until a set is reached.

Ladle into sterilised jars and seal.

Hint: in my last post, I had details about sterilising and setting point in my marmalade recipe.

CWA Show Scones

- · 4 cups of self raising flour
- Pinch of salt
- 300 mls thickened cream
- 300 mls full cream milk
- Preheat the oven to 200°C fan forced.

Method

Sift the flour with a pinch of salt

Add the mixed milk and cream and stir with a metal spoon to combine.

(This is a wet mix compared to a normal scone mixture.)

Put the scone mix onto a floured surface and softly bring the mixture together.

Pat the mixture and use a rolling pin to lightly flatten the top to about 2.5 cm high.

Cut into rounds with a cutter dipped in flour.

With a pastry brush, lightly brush the tops with milk.

Bake in the oven for 15 minutes.

Check by colour and lightly tapping the bottom of the scone.

Place on a linen tea towel and cover to keep the scones warm and soft.

Brush any flour off the bottom before serving with lashings of strawberry jam and whipped cream.

These scones are prize-winning and the pinch of salt gives a good flavour. Use the best self raising flour, as it makes a huge difference, I like to use White Wings or Lion Brand. The home brands can sometimes be great but not consistently so, ▶

and nothing is more frustrating than a scone that doesn't rise! Thickened cream now is different - Aldi still uses gelatine, others use a thickener which is vegan friendly. Either is fine to use.

As we think about our Christmas cooking, if you made marmalade, remember it makes a lovely glaze for your ham and a tablespoon added to your mixed fruit for Christmas cakes makes them

very moist. Plum puddings can be simmered in a slow cooker instead of on the stove - I love this method, as you are not constantly topping up the water.

I said, "Me, too! Protestant or Catholic?" He said, "Protestant."

I said, "Me, too! What denomination?" He said, "Baptist."

I said, "Me, too! Northern Baptist or Southern Baptist?" He said, "Northern Baptist."

I said, "Me, too! Northern Conservative Baptist or Northern Liberal Baptist?" He said, "Northern Conservative Baptist."

I said, "Me, too! Northern Conservative Baptist Great Lakes Region or Northern Conservative Baptist Eastern Region?" He said, "Northern Conservative Baptist Great Lakes Region."

I said, "Me, too! Northern Conservative Baptist Great Lakes Region Council of 1879 or Northern Conservative Baptist Great Lakes Region Council of 1912?" He said, "Northern Conservative Baptist Great Lakes Region Council of 1912." I said, "Die, heretic scum!" and pushed him off the bridge."

It looks as if the Anglican church is about to split, the recent election of Dame Sarah Mullally as Archbishop of Canterbury being the last straw for some. So, we can expect jokes to emerge soon about "GAFCON Anglicans" vs "Continuing Canterbury Anglicans" (or whatever the parties will be called).

The church has been arguing and splitting for 2,000 years or so, ever since Paul and Barnabas's stoush in Acts 15: 39 and the first Council of Jerusalem (also in Acts 15—see Galatians 1 for Paul's opening salvo on that one, and James's letter where he talks about "faith and works". You can almost feel the undercurrent there!).


From where I sit, this latest tiff is about the way we read and apply Scripture in church life, with issues like gay marriage, the role and place of women in leadership, living with nature and abortion being some of the touchstones. There's plenty of room here to fight about and to hurt each other.

Tragically, sometimes the pain cannot be contained within the one communion and splitting will be better than maintaining an unhappy unity, however far from the ideal that might take us. For each of us, we will be challenged as to how we respond. Whose side will we be on? Will we continue to see ourselves as Anglicans? How will we understand that word? Will we continue to worship with some of our brothers and sisters, or will we be forced to separate? And so on.

We have painful times ahead but, regardless, our citizenship will continue to be in heaven (Philippians 3:20) whichever route we take. No matter how important these issues are to us now, can we please treat each other as fellow children of Christ and not as "heretic scum"? And can we pray for Bishop Richard and our Parish clergy as they work to lead us through these times.

"Welcome to Phillip Island, the home of hypothermia!" These are the words immortalised with his usual London Cockney sense of humour and cheeky grin of the late, great, twice world Champion motorcycle Grand Prix rider Barry Sheene. At this point in time he had retired from racing and had become a world-renowned commentator for the motorcycles Grand Prix racing circus. Far from putting people off coming to the Island, his humour and passion for motorcycle racing further encouraged enthusiasts from all over the world to visit and explore the sites and sounds of this wonderful Island in God's "tov meod" (Hebrew 'very good' Gen 1: 31) creation.

Well, another MotoGP week has come and gone. Apparently there were more than 95,000 visitors to the Island and once again volunteers from St Philip's served memorable breakfasts and Christian hospitality to many motorcyclist visiting from all over Australia and indeed the world.

Some of our visitors are members of the

Christian Motorcyclist Association (CMA). They came not only for the MotoGP but also for the CMA National run.

The CMA was founded by Pastor Herb Shreve in Hatfield Arkansas, USA in 1974.

It became established as an Association in 1975. The first chapter of CMA Australia was formed in 1979 to encourage riders in their God-given ministries.

Their motto is "Unity in Diversity".

The Christian Motorcyclist Association is not 'a Club,' it is a not for profit missionary orientated motorcycle riders group, serving God by primarily reaching out to non-Christian motorcyclists.

This distinguishes CMA from other bikie clubs that often associate because of brand loyalty or riding style.

CMA's ministry team program is designed to: "make ministers of their members". Though still recognising the importance of ordained ministers in their leadership role within the established church, it breaks from the traditional difference between clergy and laity by calling on all of its members to be adopted into the royal priesthood and serve the Lord as declared in 1 Peter 2:9

"But you are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, His own special people, that you may proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light."

Groups of CMA members ride all over the country attending various motorcycle functions such as the recent MotoGP and Superbikes, motorcycle rallies and the up and coming annual Phillip Island Christmas Toy Run from Caldermeade Farm to Cowes on 7 December.

Part of their witness at these events is the distribution of a little booklet called:

Riding with Purpose: the Gospel of Mark

Apart from containing the Gospel of Mark it also has a few very interesting and moving testimonies and words of encouragement of bikers from all over Australia.

The CMA will also often try to co-ordinate with churches—events are known as "Church Raids". This is when a group of CMA members, with permission from whatever church it is, roll up on their bikes and become involved in the service. Generally there will be a testimony, special prayers and perhaps even a sermon.

The type of people who join the CMA are extremely diverse, Doctors and nurses, cricketers and footballers, artist and musicians, scientists and teachers, blue collar and white collar workers, CEOs and unemployed, Pastors and laity. All are welcome and all have two great things in common. The love of riding their motorcycles, but more so they love God with all their hearts, minds and souls and strive to love their neighbour as themselves.

Allow me to close with this CMA prayer.

As we gather from all points of the compass, we ask for Your divine protection over each rider. Guide our paths, keep us safe from harm, and bless our journey with your presence.



Grant us wisdom and direction as we ride, that we may honour You in all that we do. Fill our hearts with Your love and compassion, that we share Your light with everyone we meet along the way. Strengthen our bonds of fellowship and let our rides be a testament to Your grace and Mercy. Amen

Book Review

Review of Greg Sheridan:

How Christians Can Succeed Today: Reclaiming the Genius of the Early Church, p/b, Allen & Unwin, 2025.

Greg Sheridan, well known Australian journalist and much published author, has produced a book full of encouragement. Especially perhaps for those thinking that the task of being a Christian is getting too tough. Sheridan has provided us with an outstanding account of early church history, alongside an equally enticing account of the lives of seven impressive contemporary Christian believers and their story of coming to faith.


In the first section Sheridan focuses on the impact of the coming of Jesus and his ministry with the apostles. Then follows the exceptional leadership of St Paul following his encounter with the risen Christ, resulting in his transformative missions leading eventually to Europe. A section on plagues and persecutions helps the reader to understand the heavy weather the earliest Christians had to handle whilst still making a transforming impact on Roman society, Another helpful chapter on slavery, money, and children is followed by an excellent treatment of

Augustine's impact, whom Sheridan calls the first and greatest modern!

The second section takes us to our current experience as Christians, with challenging stories of contemporary Christians who have made an impact for good on many lives and in many cases continue to do so. Many of these folk are well known, others less so. They include Leila and Danny Abdallah, Jess Echeverry, Robert Barron, Mark Varughese, Rosie Drum, Jim Baden, Andrew Mathieson, Dr Laurel Moffatt, Marilyn Robinson, Mike Pence, Niall Ferguson, Dallas Jenkins, to name a few!

A useful final chapter asks us to consider "What is to be done today?" In spite of the substantial impact of the stories in the previous section, there is still nothing easy in being a Christian in

Australia today. I think the best way to answer this challenge is to read Greg Sheridan's book from the start! It has never been easy to be a witness to Jesus, but there is much in this account to encourage and enthuse us. I warmly commend How Christians can Succeed Today!
